#### **SYLLABUS**

#### Course overview

**Required Textbook** – Introduction to Geography: People, Places & Environment (6<sup>th</sup> Edition) by Dahlman, Carl T. & Renwick, William H. (2015)

All course materials, sign-up sheets, and evaluations will be posted on the course Blackboard page.

This class is in-person and synchronous.

Geography is a dynamic and interdisciplinary field of study that draws from both the physical and social sciences to examine the relationships between people and their environment. This course is a geographic approach to current issues impacting our communities and our planet considering their environmental, cultural, economic, political, and social implications. We will learn and discuss the tools (maps, GIS, Remote sensing, etc.), fundamental terms, concepts, and theories of Geography and explore how they are applied in everyday life. We will also examine the relationships between the natural, social, and built environments.

## Course objectives and learning outcomes:

By the end of the course, you will be able to:

- 1. Understand the links among people, places, and environments
- 2. Define and describe the field of geography and identify its major subfields.
- 3. Describe the basic concepts, terms, and theories of Geography.
- 4. Explain physical and social phenomena through a geographic lens.
- 5. Identify the tools and techniques used for geographic data collection and analysis.

## **Grading Criteria**

Final grades for the course will be determined according to the following percentages:

## Attendance/Participation (30%)

Attendance is mandatory and class participation is expected and is an important component of this class as you will take part in graded group projects throughout the semester. Up to two excused absences will be accepted, a third absence requires a doctor's note or similar documented reason (exceptions will be made for special circumstances). Unexcused absences will count as – 0.5 point from the attendance/participation grade. Students who miss class sessions are responsible for keeping up to date with class content and due dates listed in this syllabus and course blackboard.

## Quizzes (40%)

There will be four short quizzes over the semester. The quizzes will be multiple choice and will cover the material in the textbook and class discussions. They will be accessible on Blackboard for over a period of 7 days. Students who miss a quiz due to specific circumstances will have the possibility to ask for an exceptional re-opening of the quiz.

## Final Exam (30%)

The final exam will be a combination of multiple choice and short-answer questions, which will be based on the content you have read throughout the semester and discussed in our sessions.
