Course Description

This course will discuss topics using a global framework to study the physical and social (economic, political, and cultural) interrelationships in the world within a regional context. We will examine the concept of the region using geographic concepts and present a survey of the world's major regions, placing particular emphasis on cultural and societal structures. This course will be presented in three sections: the first section will look at regions of North America, Middle America, South America, and Europe; the second will look at the regions of Russia/Central Asia, North Africa/Southwest Asia, Subsaharan Africa, and South Asia; and the third section will look at regions of East Asia, Southeast Asia, the Austral Realm, and the Pacific and Polar Regions.

This course can be applied to either Group A or D of the Pluralism and Diversity requirements, or Stage 2B (non-W) of the GER.

Learning Outcomes

By the end of this course, students will be able to:

- Define and describe the field of geography, and identify its major subfields.
- Identify the earth's regions, and places in these regions, on a map.
- Explain physical and social phenomena within and between regions utilizing a geographic perspective.
- Display a basic understanding of political, social, and economic relationships at varying scales and outline how they are interrelated.
- Describe how the physical environment impacts social and human landscapes.
- Compare and contrast the physical and human landscapes of the major world regions.

Quizzes

You will take a series of quizzes corresponding to each chapter's region that are administered in Blackboard. A total of 12 quizzes will be given and the two lowest scoring quizzes will be discarded. These quizzes are worth 20% of your final grade and will be one method I use for taking attendance. Make-up quizzes will not be given.

Exams

You will take a total of three exams throughout the semester: two mid-semester exams and a final exam. These exams will be multiple-choice with the first and second exams being worth 25% each and the final exam worth 30% of your total grade. All exams will consist of 50 multiple choice questions and they are not cumulative. Electronic devises are not permitted during the exam and supplemental materials may not be used. Unless a force of nature prevents us from getting to Hunter College, the exam dates on the syllabus are set. Make up exams will only be given if you provide approved documentation.
