SELECTING THEMES

- The 20 landscape features should be varied and represent many different areas of the US and Canada from the Arctic to Florida and Hawaii. Choose from the list of 80.
- ❖ A mix similar to the following would provide diversity to

your portfolio: 5 physical features

5 cultural features

3 environmental/human impact features

3 features from national/state/provincial sites

2 features from colonial/pioneer times

2 features from urbanized areas

MOTIVATION: Pretend you are traveling across the continent and taking pictures of what you see for friends and family and need to explain them.

CONTENTS

The **contents** of each portfolio page must consist of the following minimum requirements:

- a title
- one thumbnail locator map showing the feature's location in North America
- one detailed readable map of the landscape feature that shows local information
- one photograph or illustration or diagram of the feature in question
- a half-page written description of the subject and its significance (no cut and paste)

PRESENTATION

- > The written description MUST be in your own words (no cut and paste).
- The verbal portion is to be done in no larger than 12-point type and take up at least half the page.
- > Typing is to be single-spaced and have standard 1-inch margins to either side.
- The layout may be either landscape or portrait mode.
- > You may use columns.



Extra Credit Option

Collect recent articles (June 2012 – May 2013) from various sources, as newspapers, magazines, professional journals, and Internet news media, that discuss one or more of the 50 US states and 13 Canadian provinces/territories.

- An article may make reference to more than one US state and/or Canadian province/territory or may discuss a geographic region within the US and Canada that include these units.
- Each article may be used to highlight a maximum of three (3) states/provinces/territories only one write-up is needed to cover the 2 or 3 mentioned.

Extra Credit Option

STEPS:

- Find pertinent articles published between June 2012 and May 2013.
- Ask yourself the question: "Where's the Geography?" Consult the Five Fundamental Themes of Geography diagram if you are not sure.
- Provide a copy of the article. Photocopy the hardcopy source or print it/copy it from its web site. (In both cases use the smallest <u>readable</u> print size to save paper).
- Number tag and cite each article.

Extra Credit Option

STEPS:

- Create an annotated bibliography by briefly summarizing the article and describing the geography found within it.
- Locate the article on the blank map by using its tag number.
- Assemble the packet according to the instruction sheet.
- Submit no later than May 21, 2013.
