INTRODUCTION: In order to study any area on earth we need to be able to place it within its larger region and be aware of the interrelationship of its parts to the whole. **PURPOSE:** This exercise will introduce you to NYS's location by identifying its boundaries- land and water, the political entities that border it, and acquainting you with the political subdivision state's 62 counties.

ASSIGNMENT: This exercise has FOUR PARTS.

Go to the **Geography of NYS Course Page** via the Dept. of Geography's home page. From the **HANDOUTS** section, **print** a NYS outline map with county boundaries. You can also photocopy or scan the outline map in the syllabus.

PART I. On the outline map, do the following:

- Add the names of all adjacent US states and Canadian provinces. Locate their borders by drawing in a small section of their boundaries where they touch NYS. Canada Vermont Massachusetts Quebec Prov. New Jersey Connecticut Ontario Prov. Pennsylvania Rhode Island
- 2. Mark in blue and label the boundaries from section 1 that are <u>found in water</u>. Be sure to look closely at the area around New York City when doing this part of the exercise. *Remember to mark only the boundary portion of the feature*.
