Course Description and Objectives

This practical hands-on course introduces programming concepts and coding techniques relevant to the computational methods in geospatial applications. The objective of this class is to master the programming concepts, tools, and skills that are instrumental to process, visualize, and analyze geospatial data.

We will learn a wide variety of topics that serve as the basis for more in-depth treatment and practical applications in subsequent courses. We will start with the basics of programming and algorithms, and work through examples for some general, mathematical, and spatial operations. We will then dive into the nuts and bolts of Python as a first language and learn how to translate basic operations into running code, in the context of representing and processing geospatial data. The class will also review some of the most used open-source and proprietary Python libraries for general and spatial data processing, visualization, and analysis. Eight programming assignments will cover various topics. A final project is required to focus on a particular area of interest.

Learning Outcomes

At the end of the semester, students should be able to

- describe generally applicable programming concepts and methods;
- config and apply programming tools and methods, particular to analyzing geospatial data;
- manage the mainstream programming environment for geocomputation;
- write and debug code in a major programming language (Python) for spatial data analysis;
- develop basic algorithmic solutions for spatial data processing problems.
